


ASA President Ji-Hyun Lee recognizes our “hidden gems,” those whose contributions often go unseen.

We're thrilled to share an important milestone in ASA's transition: the developer has completed their due diligence and is moving forward with purchasing our headquarters building! While the final sale will take several months to complete, this step gives us the confidence to begin planning our relocation.

Our plan is to remain in Old Town Alexandria, finding a space that better fits our needs. The current building is larger than necessary and requires significant resources to maintain. Relocating will allow us to free up resources to focus on programs, services, and initiatives that directly benefit our members and the broader statistical community.

Communities in Action

Building on her JSM 2026 theme, Jeri Mulrow's presidential initiative is named Communities in Action. The vision of this initiative is to empower ASA members to raise the profile of the practice and profession of statistics by partnering with community groups to foster informed decision-making. Opportunities for participation include:

- helping develop a repository with a toolkit that contains useful materials on all aspects of this initiative, including how to build relationships,
- crafting initial outreach messages
- creating and delivering effective presentations,
- volunteering to organize a community activity,
- and helping to create sustainable engagement channels between data experts and local communities.

We're excited to launch this new initiative and want to hear your thoughts on how we can make the greatest impact together. The Latest in ASA's Science Policy and Advocacy Activities

The ASA continues to advocate for the health and independence of the federal statistical system. Our recently released report, **Nation's Data at a Crossroads** report underscores the risks to federal statistical agencies, pointing to shrinking budgets, staffing shortages, political interference, and an erosion of professional autonomy. The report makes clear that urgent action is needed to safeguard the nation's data infrastructure, which underpins evidence-based policy, business decisions, and public trust.

This fall, ASA is also closely monitoring the FY2026 appropriations process, where bipartisan congressional efforts have helped stave off severe proposed cuts to NIH, though the Supreme Court's recent ruling allowing NIH to withhold \$2 billion in grants highlights the uncertainty facing research funding. Additional concerns include leadership turmoil at the CDC, where political pressure has contributed to senior staff resignations, and ongoing threats to agencies like the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), the Economic Research Service (ERS), and the National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS). ASA also continues to amplify the need to fund essential aspects of the Energy Information Agency, as well as the National Center for Health Statistics, which constitute our nation's critical infrastructure. ASA has joined coalition partners in issuing statements defending these agencies and reinforcing the importance of professional autonomy and the integrity of data-driven decision-making.

The ASA is also urging the Department of Education to recognize the central role of statistical literacy in AI education priorities and the National Science Foundation to engage the statistical community with its AI initiatives.

Ron has launched a new Statistical Moments video series spotlighting ASA's support for the federal statistical system. The first video highlights the dedication of BLS employees and affirms their integrity in the face of recent attacks. Upcoming videos emphasize why strong, trusted federal statistics are essential for every aspect of American life, from jobs and health to agriculture and education.

The series will conclude with a powerful message from the U.S. Air Force Memorial about urgent efforts to safeguard our nation's data.

On 9/24, Ron wrote to the Senate HELP Committee urging careful scrutiny of the nominee for Bureau of Labor Statistics commissioner. In his letter, he emphasized the importance of appointing a leader with deep expertise in economic statistics, strong leadership skills, and the trust of both BLS staff and the broader statistical community to guide the agency through this critical moment. ASA is also advocating to preserve the work of USDA's ERS and NASS, warning that relocating these agencies could disrupt continuity in essential agricultural data. ASA is working with the Friends of BLS coalition to defend the Bureau of Labor Statistics, issuing statements in support of its mission and staff amid political challenges. These efforts, along with the release of the Nation's Data at a Crossroads report, reinforce ASA's leadership in ensuring that U.S. federal statistics remain strong, independent, and trustworthy.

We're also excited that the work of the Federal Statistical System Modernization continues under the leadership of Bill Beach, Erica Groshen, and Nancy Potok and expert input and help of Connie Citro, Shelly Martinez, and Jen Park. They are holding their third convening on the future of federal statistics in October. We also received funding from the Lumina Foundation and the William T. Grant Foundation to undertake a project specific to the National Center for Education Statistics.

Internationally, ASA continues to stand with Andreas Georgiou, the Greek statistician persecuted for upholding data integrity, reaffirming our commitment to defending statistics and statisticians worldwide.

Your support allows the ASA to remain at the forefront of these critical conversations by defending federal statistics, protecting research funding, and advancing statistical literacy. Together, we are safeguarding the data that serve as the backbone of science, policy, and democracy.
