The Latest in ASA's Science Policy and Advocacy Activities

We continue to closely monitor areas such as federal research funding, civil service policies, and the integrity of federal statistics.

With the rate at which things change, we may not catch every issue or fully assess its impact, so we encourage you to share your insights with us through our anonymous [JotForm survey](#).

Alongside several proactive initiatives, we are also addressing emerging challenges, often in collaboration with partners in the federal research funding and statistics communities. For instance, we highlighted critical issues on LinkedIn, including the availability of federal datasets, access to sensitive data, and the cancellation of key contracts essential to the National Center for Education Statistics' data collection efforts.

We also recognize that members in the federal workforce or in positions dependent on federal funding may be experiencing employment transitions. The ASA is here to help and can offer the following basic assistance:

- Flexible dues payment arrangements or temporary waivers
- Reduced conference registration fees
- Access to career development resources and networking opportunities


